### Cemetery Tour - Eastern Cemetery - 23 March

On this year's Branch programme, you will see that Mary Stuart is to lead an afternoon's tour of parts of the Eastern Cemetery. A 1.30pm start is planned, but is weather dependent — meet at the Cemetery Office. This is a continution of a successful series first begun last year. Mary will point out resting places of some of

Invercargill's more interesting residents.

The following extract (from Legacy News March 5 2003) may help those who find tombstones sometimes puzzling.-

Understanding the Art and Symbols on Tombstones

There is nothing like a visit to an cemetery to make you feel close to an ancestor. You are walking the very ground where they were buried and where they may have walked once long ago and visited loved ones. Tombstones can be plain or they can be decorated with art and symbols and wording that have meaning you might not fully appreciate. Some examples of words or letters you might find engraved include:

"B.P.O.E." means Benevolent Protective Order of Elks

"F.L.T." with each letter in a link of a chain means Friendship, Love and Truth (see "I.O.O.F.")

"F.O.E." Means Fraternal Order of Eagles

 $\hbox{\tt "G.A.R."}$  means  $\hbox{\tt Grand}$   $\hbox{\tt Army}$  of the Republic. It was an organization of Civil War Union  $\hbox{\tt Army}$  veterans.

"I.O.O.F." means International Order of Odd Fellows (see "F.L.T.").

"V.D.M." means "verbi Dei minister" (Minister of the Word of God).

 $\hbox{\tt "W.O.W."}$  means  $\hbox{\tt "Woodmen}$  of the World". Upright tree stump markers are typical of the fraternity.

"Relict" carved on a woman's headstone means she died a widow. "Consort" means she outlived her husband.

Some examples of engraved symbols include:

Anchors and Ships: Hope or Seafaring profession

Arches: Victory in Death

Arrows: Mortality

Broken column: Loss of head of family Broken ring: Family circle severed Bugles: Military (see Trumpeters) Butterfly: Short-lived; early death Candle being snuffed: Time, mortality

Cherub: Angelic

Compass and Square: Masonic emblems

Corn: Ripe old age

Cross: Symbol of Christian hope

Crossed Swords: Officer in the military

Darts: Mortality

Doves: The soul, purity, innocence, gentleness

Father Time: Mortality, The Grim Reaper Flowers: Brevity of early existence, sorrow

Flowers: Condolence, grief, sorrow Flying Birds: Flight of the soul

Fruits : Eternal plenty

A cenotaph is not a grave marker at all. It is a monument erected in memory of someone who died elsewhere, perhaps at sea.

### **Reading Tombstones**

Urn with wreath or crepe: mourning

Winged effigies: Flight of the soul

Willows: Emblem of sorrow



Here are a few tips if you are having difficulty transcribing an old headstone.

- 1. Wet the headstone, perhaps by gently wiping with a sponge and wait for it to dry often the surface dries, leaving the indents of the letters wet.
- 2. An alternative to water is to dust the headstone with talcum powder.
- 3. Wait for the sun to move a shadow may form across the letters, making them easier to read. You can make use of a small mirror in order to reflect sunlight onto the stone from different angles.
- 4. Limit your field of vision try looking down a cardboard tube or some similar tool.

And a no-no: do not ever use modern household cleaners or bleaches to clean tombstones, as long-lasting chemical reactions can often be initiated which may in fact hasten the degradation of the stone.





### News from the Genealogical Computing Group

The Invercargill Genealogical Computing Group is made up of around 15-18 members who have a particular fas cination with computers for genealogy. They meet on the third Thursday (immediately after the Branch night) at the SeniorNet Rooms in the Menzies Building off Leven Street. The group has an annual programme of topics (see below), which is planned based on the needs of its members. There is no subscription as such to join the group; members pay a very modest \$2 per

evening to cover room hire and tea and biscuits afterwards.

If you have a home computer (or if you are thinking of getting one for recording your family data; but want some advice); then you should think about joining the group. Speak to Roger Washbourn (the Convenor) or Pam Atkinson (Secretary); or any of the other members about this. There is a range of experience represented in the group - you do not have to be a nerd to join in: there are several beginners in the group. It is a great place to learn and have problems solved.

The parent body, the Genealogical Computing Group, attracts a \$15 per year subscription, in return for which members receive a quarterly magazine =GenCom News=, an excellent publication full of up-to-date information, software reviews, and advice. See page & for their website address.

### Southland Early Settlers (Pre-1900) Register

One of the Branch's newer projects is the Southland Early Settlers (Pre-1900) Register. This was started in 2001, and matches similar projects under way in neighbouring places:

- Gore Branch calls theirs the Eastern Southland (Pre-1950)

- The Oamaru-based North Otago Branch has a North Otago Pioneer Register for Pre

- The Alexandra Branch has already published its first index of 10,000 names from its Central Otago Family Register.

Objectives are much the same for all of these projects - which is to collect and index information on the early settler/pioneer families of the southern region. Any family which was resident in Southland prior to 1900 qualifies for this project. The cut-off dates vary a little from Branch to Branch. Southland has followed the Oamaru Branch most closely, and is to use their indexing system in due course.

Forms are available from Secretary Lesley Instone, who is also the collector of completed forms. Forms and data sheets have been placed with Southland District Council libraries to cover the rural hinterland——however progress has been rather slow. The GenFair in June will be used to encourage participation in the project.

If you wish to contribute your family/families, please ask Lesley for forms and an explanatory data sheet.

### **Certificates Collection**

This is another Branch Project worthy of support and one which will eventually build a resource for NZSG members nationwide. Since the Department of Internal Affairs announced the increases in charges for obtaining copies of certificates and micrographs, the NZSG has organised a national Certificates Collection. All members of NZSG are asked to make photocopies of any/all birth, death and marriage certificates held by them, to contribute to a national certificate collection. The collection will be available to all NZSG members at much reduced costs.

Locally, this collection service is being mirrored, with local copies then being passed on to the NZSG Certificates Collection convenor in Whangarei. Lesley Instone is the Branch's collector—please pass your copies to her for local deposit and onward passage to NZSG.


